The word of God and prayer, are core to our relationship with the God of the universe. They keep us spiritually alive just as breathing keeps us physically alive.


These days the Bible is seen as an interesting artefact. Madonna once verbalised what is the consensus amongst most people these days; 'The Bible is an interesting book to read. I want my daughter to read it. But I will also explain to her that these are stories that people made up to teach people.' It stuns me the way two thousand years of scholarship is so easily cast aside by contemporary society. There are libraries written on the historical accuracy of the Bible. The Dead Sea scrolls, to which a whole museum is devoted, is a classic example of that. We don't have time today to go into why we can trust the Bibles we have, but I'm happy to chat personally with you if you are interested.

Today, I want to simply encourage you to taste and see for yourself the power of the Biblical text. Pick up Mark's story of Jesus and read it for yourself, you should easily get through it in about three hours, a good way to spend a pleasant Sunday afternoon. It appears that Bible reading amongst Christians is slowly decreasing. I suspect it's partly because of the information overload we are bombarded with these days. The graph below shows a clear trend amongst younger generations that is worrying to say the least.

Is it that we are too busy? A quick look at the time we spend on our phones seems to indicate we have time for some things. Can I encourage you to set aside time each day to commune with the living God? The author James Smart wrote, 'Without the Bible the remembered Christ becomes the imagined Christ, [a Christ shaped] by the religiosity and unconscious desires of His worshippers.' And Peter Adam gives some great advice for the busy person; 'Don't do a Bible study every day, do one on Monday and meditate on it for a week.' And David Murray; 'If your morning devotions are going to be 5 minutes, make sure you read for 1 and think for 4.'

However you do it, never forget the normal way God speaks to us is through the Bible and He has things He wants you to hear.
